Dear Neighbor:

I always looked forward to writing this letter to you in my past tenure as Mayor and this time is no exception. In this Newsletter, you will find a great deal of useful information not the least of which is an overview of the budget that was

just passed. Many hours of hard work went into this budget – it truly is a collaborative effort between the Borough Clerk/ Administrator, the CFO, the Department Heads and the Council – all of whom worked tirelessly over the past several months to deliver a budget which provides many services to our residents while holding the municipal tax increase to 1.69%. The pages of this Newsletter will provide some of the detail and if you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.

As part of this budget process, the Council approved funding to implement a new Master Plan for the Borough. The Master Plan sets forth our vision for Oradell - it provides a long-range vision for our community. It has a direct relationship to all of you, whether you live, work or own a business in Oradell, because it affects the things you do every day and how you will do them in the future. The Master Plan guides issues such as economic development, how much parking should be provided in our neighborhoods, how to protect our open space and natural resources, the preservation of historic structures and so many other decisions. The process of developing the Master Plan will include "charrettes" or planning sessions where Oradell citizens, planners and other professionals will collaborate on a vision for our future. It provides a forum for ideas, the opportunity to give immediate feedback to the professionals and allows all of you to be mutual authors of the Plan. A great deal of hard work lies ahead but with your help, we will develop a vision for Oradell which preserves its charm as the #1 Family Town in New Jersey while providing the services and businesses we need

You will also find information about upcoming events such as the Memorial Day Parade, the Farmer's Market, and the Summer Recreation Program to name a few. There is also important information on the Zika virus and prevention.

Thank you all for giving me the opportunity to again serve as your Mayor. I look forward to the challenges ahead but with your help, nothing is impossible.



Tax Collector

Tax Information is now available online at www.oradell.org in Borough Departments (on the left), WIPP-Property Tax Inquiry. Click Property Tax Inquiry, then click on the link. Enter the information and hit search. Everyone is encouraged to view the website, but the Tax Office is still available for further assistance.

Direct withdrawal for payment of taxes is still available. Simply complete the form found online or in the Tax Department and submit it with a voided check to the Tax Department. Thereafter your tax payment will be debited from your checking account when each installment is due. You will never be late!

After hours mailbox is located by the rear doors at Borough Hall. Correspondence and tax payments may be deposited here during and after Borough business hours.

Property Tax Reimbursement Program (Senior Freeze) is available for seniors and disabled persons. The eligibility requirements can be found on the Borough's website. The deadline to submit the application is June 1. If you are new to the program, you may pick up a booklet in the Tax Department. More information is available at www.nj.us/treasury/taxation/ptr/index.shtml.

2013 Homestead Benefit. Revised tax bills for the May 1, 2016 tax installment have been mailed to property owners (and mortgage companies). If you are entitled to the homestead benefit, your May billing has been reduced accordingly. Contact the New Jersey Division of Taxation, 1-888-238-1233 if you have any questions.

The Borough of Oradell Recreation Department will sponsor the 76th Summer Playground Program. We are happy to announce that we will continue to give campers the option of staying onsite during camp instead of leaving for lunch. Monday through Thursday campers who choose to stay are required to bring lunch. On Fridays, campers will have the option of ordering pizza. Slices will cost \$2 per slice and \$1 per drink. Campers will bring money on Friday morning.

The Oradell Board of Health offers a monthly Child Health Conference for Oradell children from birth through age 6 where they may receive free complete medical physical exams and all required immunizations. Zika Virus



What we know:

- \Rightarrow No vaccine exists to prevent Zika virus disease.
- \Rightarrow Prevent Zika by avoiding mosquito bites.
- ⇒ Mosquitoes that spread Zika virus bite mostly during the daytime.

Steps to prevent mosquito bites:

- \Rightarrow Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
- ⇒ Stay in places with air conditioning and window and door screens to keep mosquitoes outside.
- \Rightarrow Use EPA registered insect repellants.
- \Rightarrow Always follow the product label instructions.
- \Rightarrow Reapply insect repellent as directed.
- \Rightarrow Do not spray repellent on the skin under clothing.
- ⇒ If you are also using sunscreen, apply sunscreen before applying repellent.

To protect your child from mosquito bites:

- \Rightarrow Do not use insect repellent on babies younger than 2 months old.
- ⇒ Dress your child in clothing that covers arms and legs.
- ⇒ Cover crib, stroller, and baby carrier with mosquito netting.

Police Department

Since the inception of DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) in 1983, New Jersey has participated in the national curriculum that was set by DARE America based out of California. With the changing times, the curriculum was drastically changed in 2014 which presented a huge hurdle for DARE New Jersey. DARE America decided not to include important teachings in their new curriculum which caused alarm to all DARE officers in New Jersey as well as the DARE NJ executive board.

With drastic changes pending, the executive board researched new curricula and found a curriculum called "Too Good for Drugs" which fit the demographics and problems we have with our youth in New Jersey. Two years later, DARE New Jersey separated from DARE America which led to our new program called LEAD (Law Enforcement Against Drugs). This is our second year teaching LEAD to the fifth-graders in Oradell Public School. After a first transitional year, the second year as proven to be very successful. We just completed a series of 12 lessons which included education on all drugs and their effects as well as decision-making, being a good role model, and bullying. We look forward to our graduation ceremony on May 20th followed by a team building field day.

The LEAD officers would like to thank the Oradell Police Administration, Bergen County Municipal Drug Alliance who helps fund the program as well as the Oradell Mayor and Council who continuously support our efforts.

ORADELL PUBLIC LIBRARY

We are a quarter way through 2016, and the Library continues to be an exciting place no matter what the season - or weather. Providing vital services to our many residents and visitors and making our collections and services available 24/7 through the Library website, the Library is the place to be year-round. Oradell Public Library is a proud member of the Bergen County Cooperative Library System (BCCLS), which comprises 77 libraries in four counties (Bergen, Essex, Hudson, and Passaic), which share a catalog (www.bccls.org) and thousands of books, magazines, e-books, DVDs and Blu-Ray, audiobooks on CD, music CDs, downloadable audiobooks, e-magazines, online commercial databases, as well as streaming films and television shows. If Oradell residents want something that is not among the millions of materials in the BCCLS system, our Information Services Librarian can order it through JerseyCat, a service provided by the New Jersey State Library for accessing materials not only from public libraries, but from academic and special libraries throughout the State and country, if need be. Oradell residents may also access Ancestry, the genealogical web database, and Mango Languages, a foreign language learning and English as a Second Language (ESL) service, both online. This is all free with a card from Oradell Public Library.

If you are a new resident, please stop by the Library with proof of residency and get your library card, which opens up the door to all these materials and services, and you will also receive a welcome packet of useful information. If you have not used the Library in recent years, please come and check out all that is new.

Here are just a few of the reasons why Oradell Public Library is the place to be:

•Comfortable reading rooms, well-appointed reading areas, quiet study carrels, pre-school and teen facilities, and craft and meeting areas. Eighteen computers for public use with access to the Internet. Wireless (Wi-Fi) access on all three floors.

•Museum Pass Program: free access for Oradell individuals and families to four museums and institutions in New York City.

•Two book clubs, morning and evening; Cookbook Club; and IFC Film Club (film discussion group)
